### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

**CATCH THIS:** Boston's all-time leader in games caught, Varitek begins his 12th major league season, all with the Red Sox...Has appeared in at least 130 games in 5 of the last 6 seasons and has tallied double digits in home runs in each of the last 6 campaigns...Enters 2008 with a career major league average of .267 with 148 home runs and 611 RBI in 1199 games.

**ON THE CHARTS:** Ranks among the top 20 players in Red Sox franchise history in games played (12th), doubles (T14th, 246), home runs (17th), walks (17th, 477), and RBI (19th).

Has 103 homers as a catcher since 2002, 2nd most among A.L. backstops in that span behind Jorge Posada (130)...Has 146 career homers while catching with the Red Sox, 2nd on club's all-time list, 11 behind Carlton Fisk...Has homered in 23 different ballparks in the regular season, tying Manny Ramirez and John Valentin for the all-time club record.

Has driven in 402 runs while catching since 2002, 2nd among A.L. catchers behind Posada (519).

**1000 IN 2006:** Varitek in 2006 became the first catcher in Red Sox history to catch 1,000 games and the 106th player in major league history to reach the milestone...Moved past Hall of Famer Carlton Fisk, who held the Boston club record with 990 career games caught before Varitek surpassed that total on July 18, 2006 vs. Kansas City...Caught his 1000th game on July 31, 2006.

**AWARDS AND HONORS:** Was honored with the 2006 Red Sox Heart and Hustle Award from the local chapter of the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association...The honor is presented to a player who exemplifies the values, tradition, and spirit of the game of baseball.

Had arguably his best major league season in 2005, when he was honored with his first career Silver Slugger Award as well as his first Rawlings Gold Glove...Became the first Red Sox catcher to receive a Silver Slugger honor (presented since 1980)...Is the 3rd Red Sox backstop to take home a Gold Glove, joining Carlton Fisk (1972) and Tony Pena (1991)...Varitek's Gold Glove was the first by any Red Sox player since Pena's honor 14 years earlier...In 2005, only 3 other major leaguers won both a Silver Slugger Award and a Gold Glove: Andruw Jones of the Braves, Derrek Lee of the Cubs and Mark Teixeira of the Rangers...Only 2 other Red Sox have ever won a Silver Slugger and Gold Glove in the same season: Dwight Evans in 1981 and Ellis Burks in 1990.

Received the Thomas A. Yawkey Award in 2003, presented annually by the Boston chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America to the Red Sox MVP.

In his first full ML season in 1998, was named Red Sox Rookie of the Year by the Boston baseball writers.

**SEEING STARS:** A 2-time American League All-Star (2003, 2005), Varitek in 2005 was voted to start the All-Star Game for the first time in his career...Went 1-for-1 with a walk and a run scored in the July 12 All-Star Game at Comerica Park in his native Detroit...Delivered an in-field single to short off John Smoltz in the 2nd inning...

Walked against Livan Hernandez and came around to score in the 4th.

Although he did not appear in the game in 2003, Varitek was selected to his first A.L. All-Star team in the *etopps* All-Star Final Vote on MLB.com...Joined teammates Manny Ramirez (who was chosen to start in fan balloting) and Nomar Garciaparra (who was selected as a reserve in the first Player Vote) on the roster for the 74th All-Star Game, which was played July 15 at U.S. Cellular Field in Chicago...More than 10.6 million votes were cast in the Final Vote...Varitek outpolled White Sox first baseman Frank Thomas, Yankees first baseman Jason Giambi, A's outfielder Eric Byrnes and Angels catcher Bengie Molina.

**OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN:** Upon signing his 4-year contract on December 24, 2004, Varitek was named the 18th full-time captain in Red Sox history...According to research by Howard W. Rosenberg, Varitek is the first Sox captain since Jim Rice (1986-89)...Before Rice, Carl Yastrzemski served as captain in 1966 and 1969-83...Yaz was the club's first captain since Jimmie Foxx (1940-42) and only the 2nd Sox captain since 1923...from the inaugural 1901 season through 1923, the Red Sox had 14 different full-time captains, most serving for a single season.

**POST-SEASON PERFORMER:** Is Boston's all-time post-season leader in games (53) and at bats (194), ranks 2nd in doubles (12) and runs (33), and is 3rd in hits (50), homers (10) and RBI (32)...Has appeared in 42 of Boston's last 43 playoff games beginning in 2003, batting .268 (40-149) with 8 home runs, 27 RBI and 25 runs scored.

Appeared in all 14 of Boston's post-season games in 2007, including 13 starts at catcher...The lone game he did not start was Game 4 of the ALCS at Cleveland, as Doug Mirabelli was behind the plate for Tim Wakefield's start on the mound...At the plate, Varitek batted .269 (14-52) with 5 doubles, a home run, 10 RBI, 6 runs and 3 walks...Went 8-for-19 (.421) with 5 RBI and 4 runs in his final 5 games after batting just .182 (6-33) in his first 9 post-season contests...Hit safely in 10 of the 14 games overall...Homer in Game 3 of the ALCS at Cleveland off Jake Westbrook was Varitek's 10th career post-season blast, tied with Johnny Bench and Javy Lopez for most ever by a catcher (while catching in game).

Appeared in 28 of Boston's 29 post-season games from 2003-05, batting .268 (26-for-97) with 7 home runs, 17 RBI and 19 runs scored...Went 3-for-10 (.300) with an RBI and a run scored in 3 games in the 2005 ALDS vs. Chicago...Appeared in every game and started 13 of 14 post-season contests behind the plate in 2004 (all but Game 1 of the World Series, when Doug Mirabelli got the starting nod for Tim Wakefield's lone post-season start)...Hit .245 (13-for-53) in the post-season with 3 homers and 11 RBI...Went 2-for-12 (.167) in the ALDS vs. Anaheim, but, with the Sox down 3-1 in the 6th in Game 2, launched a 2-run homer off Bartolo Colon to tie the game they'd eventually win 8-3...Hit .321 (9-for-28) with a double, 2 homers, 7 RBI and 5 runs scored in the ALCS against the Yankees...Went just 2-for-13 (.154) with 2 runs scored in the World Series, but one of his hits was a 2-run triple with 2 outs in the first inning of Game 2 that set Sox on their way to a 6-2 win...Appeared in 11 of the Red Sox' 12 post-season games in 2003, starting 9 (all but Tim Wakefield's 3 starts)...Hit .294 (10-for-34) with 2 doubles, 4 homers, 5 RBI and 8 runs...His 4 homers were 2nd on the club to Todd Walker, and are tied for 2nd-most in club history in a single postseason.

**2007 HIGHLIGHTS**

**SUMMARY:** Enjoyed a healthy season and finished 4th on the Red Sox with 17 homers...He also tied for 4th with 71 walks and ranked 6th with 68 RBI...Started 121 games behind the plate, 3rd most of any A.L. catcher, and led the league with a club record 982 total chances.

**BATTING:** Had a slow start, batting .225 in 1st 21 games through May 1...Posted a .367 (18-49) average over next 14 games to improve to season best .283 on May 22...Batted .265 (47-177) in his next 53 games and was at .273 through August 4...Hit just .225 (34-151) over last 48 games...Tied career best with 4 hits, May 8 at Toronto...Longest hitting streak was 5 games on 3 occasions.

**HOMERS/RBI:** His 17 homers ranked 4th among A.L. catchers and were 5 more than in 2006... Homered in consecutive games, September 21-22 at Tampa Bay...September 22 blast tied game in 9th as Boston went on to win and clinch playoff spot...Homered 3 times in 5-game span, May 27-June 2 with 3 in 6 games, September 21-27...Hit the Red Sox' 4th and final consecutive homer on the 3rd inning to tie major league record on April 22 vs. the Yankees...His bat from that blast was sent to the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown...Placed 3rd among A.L. catchers with 66 RBI, 11 more than in 2006.

**FIELDING:** Had a .994 fielding percentage (6 E/982 TC), 6th best in the league, in 125 total games behind the plate...Committed just one error in his final 78 games...Threw out 23.2% (19 of 82) of attempted basestealers.

Was behind the plate for Clay Buchholz' no-hitter on September 2 versus Baltimore...Was his 3rd no-hitter to catch, the others being Hideo Nomo in 2001 and Derek Lowe in 2002...Is one of 12 catchers to be behind the plate for 3 regulation no-hitters since 1900.

**2007 NOTES:** Was 3-for-7 as a pinch-hitter and has a career pinch average of .295 (28-95)...Ranks 2nd among Red Sox players in pinch hits and average since 1974 behind Rick Miller (49/.297)...Led the Red Sox in strikeouts (122), his 2nd most ever in a season (126 in 2004).

**PREVIOUS CAREER HIGHLIGHTS**

**2006:** Was limited by a left knee injury to only 103 games, his lowest total since 2001 (51 games)...batted .238 with 19 doubles, 12 home runs, 55 RBI and 46 runs...drew 46 walks, contributing to his .325 on-base percentage...his batting average was the lowest of his major league career, 10 percentage points below his 2000 mark of .248...was placed on the 15-day disabled list on August 1 with torn cartilage in his left knee that required surgery on August 3...was activated on September 3 after appearing in 2 rehab games for Triple-A Pawtucket...was batting .243 with 11 homers and 50 RBI in 85 games at the time of the D.L. stint and hit .213 (13-for-61) with a homer and 5 RBI in 18 games after being reinstated...appeared in 3 games for Team USA in the inaugural World Baseball Classic, going 2-for-7 (.286) with a homer, 4 RBI and a run...his homer was a grand slam off Canada's Eric Cyr in an 8-6 loss on March 8.

**2005:** An All-Star starter for the first time in his career, Varitek batted .281 with 22 home runs and 70 RBI in 133 games...earned his first career Silver Slugger Award as well as his first Rawlings Gold Glove Award...became the 26th Red Sox to hit 100 home runs when he went deep off the Yankees' Randy Johnson April 14 at Fenway...led the club with a career-high average of 4.15 pitches seen per plate appearance, tied for 6th most in the A.L.

**2004:** Batted a career-best .296 with 18 home runs and 73 RBI in 137 games...his 2004 average was 23 points higher than his previous career high...also established personal bests with 137 hits, 62 walks and 10 stolen bases, finishing 2nd on the team in steals, 9 behind Sox leader Johnny Damon...his .390 on-base percentage, 10th-best in the A.L., was another career best...had a 15-game hitting streak from August 17-September 10, one shy of his 2002 career high.

**2003:** Was selected to his first A.L. All-Star team and received the Thomas A. Yawkey Award, presented annually by the Boston chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America to the Red Sox MVP...established career highs with 25 home runs, 85 RBI and a .512 slugging percentage in 142 games, 2 shy of his 1999 career best...became just the 2nd catcher in Red Sox history to twice hit 20 homers in a season...only 2 others have done it once...Carlton Fisk turned the trick 4 times (1972-73, 1977-78), Rich Gedman once (1984) and Mike Stanley once (1996)...85 RBI were the 3rd-most RBI ever by a Boston catcher...Carlton Fisk knocked in 102 in 1977 and 88 in 1978.

**2002:** After missing the final 4 months of 2001, came back to appear in 132 games, including 121 starts behind the plate...posted a .996 fielding percentage (4 errors in 970 chances), 3rd-best in a season by a Boston catcher...ranked 2nd in the A.L. in total chances...hit a team-best .360 in 25 July games...the month was highlighted by a career-best 16-game hitting streak, July 14-31...Was

the longest hitting streak by a Red Sox catcher since Carlton Fisk hit in 16 straight to end 1977 season.

**2001:** Appeared in only 51 games before he fractured his right elbow on a diving catch of a foul pop up, June 7 vs. Detroit...underwent season-ending surgery performed by Dr. Bill Morgan on June 12...was behind the plate for Hideo Nomo's no-hitter April 4 at Baltimore...his first long ball of the season was his first career walk-off blast, an 11th-inning shot off Jeff Tam that gave the Sox a 5-4 win May 13 vs. Oakland...posted a career-best 3-homer, 7-RBI day in a 10-3 win May 20 at Kansas City...finished the day 4-for-4 with homers off Brian Meadows in the 2nd and 4th and off Mac Suzuki in the 8th.

**2000:** Hit .248 with 10 homers and 65 RBI in 139 games...threw out 23 percent of runners attempting to steal (34 of 148)...made 128 appearances (119 starts) behind the plate.....underwent post-season surgery on his right wrist.

**1999:** Appeared in a career-high 144 games and established personal bests that still stand with 483 at-bats, a team-high 39 doubles, 70 runs and 233 total bases...his 39 doubles matched Carlton Fisk's 1978 total for most ever by a Red Sox catcher...finished 2nd among A.L. catchers with 140 games and 130 starts...led M.L. catchers with 1,049 chances and 972 putouts.

**1998:** In his first full M.L. season, was named Red Sox Rookie of the Year by the Boston baseball writers...batted .253 with 7 homers and 33 RBI...was 1-for-5 in his first career start April 2 at Oakland...delivered his first RBI April 10 vs. Seattle, and collected his first steal May 8 at Kansas City...2 days later, hit his first homer off the Royals' Jose Rosado...posted his first 2-homer game and knocked in 5 September 15 at New York.

**1997:** Started with Seattle's Triple-A Tacoma club, but was acquired by the Red Sox July 31...after 20 games at Pawtucket, had his contract purchased September 9...made his major league debut September 24 at Detroit, delivering a 9th-inning pinch-hit single.

**1996:** Was named Player of the Year at Double-A Port City, batting .262 with 34 doubles, 12 homers and 67 RBI...led the club in doubles and homers, while ranking 2nd in RBI...led Southern League catchers with a .993 fielding percentage, charged with only 5 errors in 108 games...played for Peoria in the Arizona Fall League.

**1995:** After being selected in the first round (14th overall) by the Mariners in 1994, made his pro debut with 104 games at Double-A Port City...hit his first pro homer May 7 vs. Jacksonville...following the season, batted .281 for Peoria in the AFL.

### PERSONAL

Jason and his wife Karen have 3 daughters: Alexandra Rose (1/14/00), Kendall Anne (9/30/01) and Caroline Morgan (6/13/05)...attended Georgia Tech, where he was a 3-time All-American and was named *Baseball America's* College Player of the Year in 1993...the publication later named him to its "All-Time College All-Star Team"...was one of 3 baseball players among Georgia Tech's 50 Greatest Athletes of the 20th Century, and his No. 33 is the only jersey retired in Georgia Tech history...continues to hold most Georgia Tech offensive records...was drafted by the Twins in the first round (21st overall) in 1993, but returned to school...was a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic baseball team in Barcelona...was inducted into the Cape Cod League Hall of Fame in 2002...is a 1990 graduate of Lake Brantley High School in Longwood, FL, where he was primarily a third baseman...hobbies: fishing and golf.

**JASON IN THE COMMUNITY:** With the Red Sox, Jason has been not only a leader on the field but also in the community...Led all Red Sox players with 28 community appearances in 2007... Participated in the Southwest Florida Children's Hospital Celebrity Golf Classic; Attended the Welcome Home Dinner to benefit the Red Sox Foundation; Continued his Tek's 33's program, which began in 2004, inviting patients from Children's Hospital Boston to see a game at Fenway; Signed autographs and posed for photos with kids as part of the MLB Players Trust Buses for Baseball program; Teamed up with the Massachusetts Teacher's Association as the Verizon Literacy Champion spokesman; Hosted the 2nd annual Jason Varitek Celebrity Putt-Putt Tournament, proceeds benefiting Children's Hospital Boston and The Celebrities for Charity Foundation; Co-hosted the Pitching in for Kids Charity Golf Tournament and Kickoff party with Tim Wakefield; Attended Picnic in the Park to benefit the Red Sox Foundation; Made an appearance at the Jason Varitek Baseball Camp; Served as a Boston Action Team Player as part of the MLB Players Trust Boston Action Team; And met with children as part of the Make-A-Wish program during the season...Also led all Red Sox players in community appearances in 2005.
